2010 CENSUS

Next year is the year of the 2010 census. The United States Constitution mandates a headcount every 10 years. This is very important as the population total from the census determines the number of seats each state has in the House of Representatives and in Legislative districts. The total local population also effects funding in our community. The distribution of \$300 billion is at stake so it is very important for an accurate count. So please cooperate with the census takers. You will be hearing a lot about it soon. The census count has to be submitted to the President by December 31, 2010.

REPORT FROM THE MAYOR

SWINE FLU (H1N1)

Our nation is now experiencing a new flu. It is referred to most often as Swine Flu. Our National, State and County medical experts learn more each day. I have daily conference calls for Swine Flu updates and will do everything I can to keep Glenwillow residents informed. Currently, there is no vaccine to prevent an individual from contracting Swine Flu. There are; however, everyday actions that you can take to help prevent the spread of germs that cause respiratory illnesses like influenza. Take these everyday steps to protect your health:

- ◆ Cover your nose and mouth with a tissue or the crook of your arm when you cough or sneeze. Throw the tissue in the trash after you use it.
- ◆ Wash your hands often with soap and water, especially after you cough or sneeze. Alcohol-based hand cleaners are also effective.
- ◆ Avoid touching your eyes, nose or mouth. Germs spread this way.
- ◆ Try to avoid close contact with sick people.
- ◆ If you get sick with influenza, the Center for Disease Control (CDC) recommends that you stay home from work or school and limit contact with others to keep from infecting them.
- ◆ Take caution when working with infected individuals, and/or those who have been to infected areas.

The symptoms of Swine Flu may include:

- ◆ Fever (greater than 100 degrees F)
- ◆ Sore throat
- ◆ Cough
- ◆ Stuffy nose
- ◆ Chills
- ◆ Headache and body aches
- ◆ Fatigue
