## RECYCLING REMINDERS

Recycling contamination is a major problem. Contamination happens when well-intended recyclers mistakenly put the wrong items into their recycling. It can wreak havoc on the recycling process throughout the world.

The best way to avoid recycling contamination in your curbside recycling is to recycle only these five core items:

CANS: Empty and rinse.

- CARTONS: Empty and rinse. Replace the cap -- it's too small to be recycled by itself!
- GLASS BOTTLES & JARS: Empty and rinse.
- PAPER & BOXES: Flatten cardboard items, like cereal boxes, to save space.
- PLASTIC BOTTLES & JUGS: Empty and rinse. Replace the cap.

Place these items loose – not bagged – in your recycling bin. All items should be empty, clean and dry. Plastic bottles and jugs include items with an opening or neck that is narrower than the body.

## **LEAF COLLECTION**

The weekly leaf collection service will begin the last week of October and continue through November weather permitting.

Residents are asked to follow a few simple guidelines to help keep this service cost-effective and efficient for all:

- Leaves must be out no later than 7:30 AM on Mondays, in order to guarantee collection in that round.
- Leaves should be placed on the tree lawn in neatly stacked piles. (grass area within 10 feet of the pavement edge)
- Where a ditch exists along the pavement edge, leaves should be placed ON THE STREET SIDE of the ditch rather than behind or in the ditch.
- Piles must be free of stumps, branches, grass clippings and other yard waste such as, briars, vines, and anything with thorns to be collected.

The Service Department will pick up only those materials that conform to the above guidelines.


- Don't use a cell phone or other electronic device while driving on Halloween night.

- Do not pass other vehicles that have stopped in the roadway, they could be dropping off children.




## BACK TO SCHOOL: SHARING THE ROAD SAFELY WITH SCHOOL BUSES

School days bring congestion; Yellow school buses are picking up children; kids on bikes are hurrying to get to school before the bell rings; hurried parents are trying to drop off their kids at school before going to work. It's never more important for drivers to slow down and pay attention than when kids are present, especially before and after school.

It is illegal to pass a school bus that is stopped to load or unload children. Flashing yellow lights indicate the bus is preparing to stop to load or unload children. Motorists should slow down and prepare to stop their vehicles. Flashing red lights and extended stop arms indicate the bus has stopped and children are getting on or off. Motorists must stop their cars and wait until the red lights stop flashing, the extended stop arm is withdrawn and the bus begins moving before they can start driving again.







## DRIVE SOBER OR GET PULLED OVER



Every day, almost 30 people in the United States die in alcohol related crashes. That is one person every 48 minutes. Alcohol is a substance that reduces the function of the brain, impairing thinking, reasoning and muscle coordination. All these abilities are essential to operating a vehicle safely.

Drug-Impaired Driving is also illegal and very dangerous. Driving while impaired by any substance, legal or illegal, puts you and others in harm's way. Many substances, including over-the-counter and prescription drugs, impair the ability to drive because they slow coordination, judgement and reaction times. Some can even cause extreme drowsiness and dizziness. Remember: If you feel different, you drive different.

## ARE YOU GETTING UNWANTED CALLS? IT COULD BE SCAMMERS CALLING.

Scammers can use the internet to make calls from all over the world. They don't care if you're on the National Do Not Call Registry. That's why your best defense against unwanted calls is blocking. Don't trust your caller ID. Scammers can make any name or number show up on your caller ID. This is called "spoofing". ## SOCIAL SECURITY AND MEDICARE SCAMS

These types of scams are on the rise! Please remember that government agencies will rarely, if ever, call you. If they do, it will be after they send you a letter or to return a call you made to them first. Government employees will not threaten to take away benefits or demand payment by wire transfer or gift card. If a caller asks for your Social Security number, bank account number, credit card information or Medicare number, hang up.

## **PARKING REMINDER**



There is **NO PARKING** on any residential street here in the Village. Now that winter is approaching, it is imperative that residents follow this Village Ordinance. It is important that the Service Dept. be able to have full accessibility to our streets for plowing and salting. If you are having a party, special event or visitors, **please contact the Police Department for parking permission**. When permission is granted, be sure to park on the side of the street opposite from the fire hydrants. Parking on both sides of the street is prohibited.

## **MOSQUITO PREVENTION INFORMATION**

#### HELP PREVENT MOSQUITO ACTIVITY

- Dispose of containers that collect water (buckets, tires, cans, flowerpots, etc.)
- Eliminate areas of standing water
- Repair leaky outdoor faucets that leave puddles
- Empty and refill bird baths at least once a week
- Clean, drain and cover pools or hot tubs if not in use
- · Unclog all gutters so they drain properly
- Fill tree holes with tar or cement
- Tightly screen all openings of your home
- Keep children indoors during times of peak mosquito activity (1 hour before and 1 hour after sunset)

#### WEST NILE VIRUS

- West Nile Virus (WNV) is the leading cause of mosquito-borne disease in the continental United States
- It is most commonly spread to people by the bite of an infected mosquito
- · Cases of West Nile Virus occur during mosquito season, which starts in the summer and continues through fall
- There are no vaccines to prevent or medications to treat WNV in people
- About 1 in 5 people who are infected develop a fever and other symptoms
- About 1 out of 150 infected people develop a serious, sometimes fatal illness

#### PREVENT PERSONAL EXPOSURE

Use insect repellent containing DEET, picaridin, or lemon eucalyptus oil and follow the label directions.

#### **SYMPTOMS**

People who have symptoms including high fever, headaches, muscle aches, vomiting and loss of appetite for two to 15 days after a mosquito bite should seek medical attention and advise their doctor of the prior exposure to biting mosquitoes.

#### REPORT A PROBLEM

Please contact CCBH at 216.201.2000 to report areas of persistent standing water or heavy populations of biting mosquitoes.

Cleveland Water offers two discount programs to assist income-eligible customers with the cost of their water bill. Both programs provide residents who qualify with the option to receive discounted rates concerning their water bill.

#### The Homestead Discount

The Homestead Discount Program offers a lower fixed charge and consumption rate. To qualify for the Homestead Discount Program, customers must meet the following criteria:

- Must be 65 years or older, or totally and permanently disabled;
- Must own and live at the property; and
- Must have current income at or below the current income guidelines.

## Water Affordability Program

• The Water Affordability Program offers a 40% discount on all standard water charges. This includes both the monthly fixed charge and the consumption charge. To qualify for the program, a customer must own and live at the applying service address and have a total household income at or below the current income guidelines

## **FIRE PREVENTION WEEK**

October 6-12, 2019

The easiest way to remember is to change the batteries in the smoke alarms on the weekend when clocks are placed back to standard time in the fall.

Daylight savings time ends November 3rd. Clocks are turned backward 1 hour.

Change Your Clock – Change Your Battery

- 1. Remove the smoke alarm from the wall or ceiling.
- 2. Look at the back of the alarm for the date of manufacture.
- 3. Smoke alarms should be replaced 10 years from the date of manufacture.
- 4. Put the alarm back on the ceiling or wall if it is less than 10 years old.

Cuyahoga County's ReadyNotify emergency notification system is in the process of upgrading to a new platform, called CodeRED. ReadyNotify is Cuyahoga County's emergency notification system. The system is used by the County and any participating communities to send messages concerning emergencies, weather events, and community news. As part of this transition, citizens currently subscribed to ReadyNotify must re-register in the upgraded system by visiting readynotify.us or at www.glenwillow-oh.gov.

The Village of Glenwillow uses **CodeRED** to send EMERGENCY notifications by phone, email, text and social media to keep citizens informed of emergencies such as evacuation notices, utility outages, water main breaks, fire or floods, chemical spills, or other emergency situations.

The Village may also activate CodeRED to send GENERAL notifications to registered subscribers to communicate non-life-threatening safety matters, such as planned road closures, water main repairs, water and power service interruptions, etc. By selecting the box for GENERAL alerts, you can also receive these types of notifications.

There is no charge to register for or use CodeRED and your personal information will be kept confidential. Registering for CodeRED is quick and easy:

## Things to Know About CodeRED

- · CodeRED delivers notifications by phone, email, text, social media, and/or mobile alerts
- CodeRED is compatible with TDD/TTY devices for those with hearing impairments
- Individuals and businesses may add as many phone numbers, email and texts numbers as they choose

**CodeRED Mobile Alert App** 

Residents and visitors can now receive enhanced public safety alerts no matter where you are located via the CodeRED Mobile Alert app, a free public safety app for both Android and iPhone users. The CodeRED Mobile Alert app delivers community and emergency alerts to individuals targeted within an impacted geographical area. The app enables you to receive timely notifications when you are on the road, away from home.

If you are currently a CodeRED subscriber that has already registered your mobile phone to get notifications, you will continue to receive calls. However, if you download the app, you will also be able to get alerts to your smartphone anywhere in the country, including Hawaii, Puerto Rico, and Alaska.

## TINKER'S CREEK TRAIL-SOUTH IS NOW RE-OPENED

Repairs have been made to the Tinker's Creek Trail-South. The trail was previously closed due to repaving and improvements, but we are happy to report the trail is now open!

This part of the multi-purpose trail runs from Pettibone Road south to the end of Bond Street along Tinker's Creek. The trail is 10 feet wide with an asphalt surface. Access to the trail is completely handicap accessible and meets all ADA requirements. If you get the chance take a stroll or ride your bike down this part of the trail to enjoy the scenes of the creek. The trail opens to an area that was previously inaccessible

to the public. Whether walking or riding your bike for exercise or recreation, this part of the trail makes for a peaceful alternative to enjoy wildlife and nature. For easier access to the trail you can park in the trailhead parking lot, walk east along the trail on Pettibone Road until the connection for the trail, just west of Tinker's Creek.
