Congratulations to Samuel Oguntoyinbo, a Glenwillow resident and a Senior at Solon High School. Samuel was named the 11th Grand Prize Winner at the Maltz Museum of Jewish Heritage's 11th annual Stop The Hate Youth Speakout for his essay. The contest focused on students speaking out in support of diversity and inclusion. Samuel's essay was selected from thousands of essays. The grand prize was a scholarship worth \$40,000. Samuel is a member of the Academic College, Science Olympiad, and Mock Trial teams. An enthusiastic student of both biology and English, he intends to study neuroscience and comparative literature at Yale University.



Again, congratulations to Samuel on this great honor and achievement. We wish you all the best and may you be an inspiration for others as you move forward with your life.

Read on to read Samuel's award winning essay:

He thumbed through the wad of bills, mouthing the numbers almost silently, until he caught me staring at him. Starting again, he counted to four, out loud this time, slowly, deliberately, almost mockingly. "Then add the one I paid you, and it makes five. And that's how you make change, boy, I blinked twice, taken aback, and froze for a second as the pale customer sauntered off, proud of himself for having taught me a valuable "lesson."

Throughout my life, I've found myself in these unsettling situations, forced to determine whether a line was crossed, and often doomed to wonder whether it even matters. A crippling sense of powerlessness has washed over me time and time again, as I feel powerless to change who I am as a black man, powerless to speak to the ignorance of the bigoted, powerless to free myself from the suffocating presence of deep-seated prejudice. Like a virus injecting its noxious DNA into its host, prejudice often threatens to infect me with its self-destructive ideas. It tells me that I have simply drawn the genetic short straw and was cursed with blackness, an unfortunate quality that makes me something less than a human being.

I've always loved words; their power and nuance make them incredibly versatile tools of expression. Every word has different connotations, associations, "shades of meaning," when viewed from different perspectives, a complexity that can be as destructive as it is beautiful. Take the word "black," for example. In a dictionary, it is simply the absence of visual light. In my mind, it is a part of my identity and that of my family. In a mind left vulnerable by ignorance and corrupted by hatred, however, it is a dirty word, representative of something lesser, something other, something that should be met with derision and repulsion, fear, and hate. These associations flash through a person's mind almost instantaneously, but they arise from a predetermined set of beliefs – the framework for what we call prejudice. This was what I had experienced at work, what I feel when I notice cautious eyes following me through a room, or when I hear someone speak slowly, as to a child, when addressing me.

These issues are almost endemic to the society we live in. However, that doesn't make speaking out futile or unnecessary. This fall, my school's Mock Trial team, a club I help lead, worked to raise money for the Ohio Innocence Project, an organization that provides legal representation for unjustly imprisoned individuals, a disproportionate number of whom are black. Through the fundraiser, I engaged in meaningful conversations about race with classmates and staff, finding that everyone had much more common ground than they expected. I believe that once we educate others and reinforce our shared humanity, we can do away with much of the ignorance, bigotry, and hatred that plague us as a society. While this is much easier said than done, the

pursuit of this goal is well worth the work it entails.

RESIDENTIAL KNOX BOX PROGRAM

The Residential Knox Box program entails the provision of a metal box that is secured with a key lock. The Oakwood Village Fire Department maintains the only key to the Knox Box which opens the secure box. The Knox Box is positioned on the entrance door of the home that is intended for normal access. The key for this entrance door is stored inside the locked Knox Box. A sticker to identify the presence of the Knox Box is placed on doors and/or windows of the home to notify emergency responders that a Knox Box is in use.

Eligibility to Participate in the Knox Box Program

- Resident of Glenwillow
- Permanent or temporary medical disability
- Spend all or a substantial majority of day alone at home
- Agree to participate in program
- Sign application and release form
- Participation of eligible residents is at no charge

Non-eligible residents may obtain a Knox Box by paying a \$150.00 refundable deposit to the Oakwood Village Fire Department.

HOUSEHOLD HAZARDOUS WASTE COLLECTION DAY SATURDAY MAY 17TH 9:00 AM TO 1:00 PM








- Oil or solvent-based paint, sealers, primers, or coatings (aerosols or liquids)
- Varnishes, polyurethanes, shellacs
- Paint thinner, mineral spirits, turpentine
- Pesticides, herbicides, fungicides
- Caustic household cleaners
- Pool chemicals
- Automotive fluids, motor oil, car batteries
- Adhesives, roof tar, driveway sealer
- Kerosene, gasoline, lighter fluid

Materials NOT accepted at this collection

- Latex paint
- Explosives, gun powder, ammunition, flares

NATIVE SEED SALE

Planting native plants can improve the curb appeal of a home, boost its resale value, all while protecting our environment with their long root systems which hold in soil, slow stormwater runoff and provide vital food and habitat for birds, insect pollinators and many other species.



Native seed packets for sale (each seed packet covers 250 sq. feet)

MESIC WOODLAND EDGE - Have a shady spot in your yard and don't know what to do with it? This Mesic Woodland Edge packet is perfect for that area where you don't think anything will grow. All of the species in this mix are native to Ohio and are commonly found on woodland edges and in open meadows. Lower light levels are welcome. Performs well in areas that are not too wet or dry.

RAIN GARDEN - The Rain Garden native seed mix is composed of native grasses and wildflowers that can tolerate wet events and dry areas based on season and the amount of rainfall. Also filters stormwater runoff. The mix contains grasses, grass-like species and wildflowers. Beneficial and beautiful, the Rain Garden creates diverse color and is attractive to butterflies and hummingbirds.

EASTERN GREAT LAKES NATIVE POLLINATOR - Bring back the pollinators with a mix especially designed for Ohio, Indiana, Western Pennsylvania and Western New York. Mostly Wildflowers, this mix is designed to give pollinators a place to stop all season long and are regionally adapted and open pollinated. We've partnered with The Xerces Society and this neonicotinoid and pesticide free mix has their seal of approval.

BUTTERFLY/HUMMINGBIRD - It doesn't get better than this mix for attracting butterflies and hummingbirds. The three different species of milkweed contained in this mix are host plants for the migrating Monarch butterfly. Watch in amazement as they complete their life cycle on these plants and use them as a source of nectar. Humming-birds will love the bright colors and tubular flowers. The grasses contained in this packet add structure and diversity.

MESIC ANNUAL/PERENNIAL FORBS - This mix is strictly wildflowers designed to provide first year color giving the perennials time to establish underneath.

ANNUAL SEED MIX - This annual wildflower mix is composed of four native prairie flowers and two introduced species. It is great for quick color and can be used along or to augment existing areas for additional color.

Western Reserve Land Conservancy

TINKER'S CREEK CONSERVATION CORRIDOR EXPANDS

Western Reserve Land Conservancy recently partnered with the Village of Glenwillow to conserve 35 acres and nearly half a mile of Tinker's Creek, the largest tributary to the Cuyahoga River.

Importantly, the conservation and creation of Tinker's Creek Preserve II not only supports the health of the watershed, but also the health of the local community.

Tinkers Creek Preserve II is an important addition to nearby established parks like the 2,290-acre Cleveland Metroparks Bedford Reservation as well as three additional properties owned by the Village of Glenwillow that total nearly 60 acres. This includes the 17.5-acre Tinker's Creek Preserve I created by the Land Conservancy and the Village in 2014.


According to Mayor Mark Cegelka, the corridor of conservation properties will support potential trail connections and an expanded greenway network that will connect Cleveland Metroparks to the heart of Village "It is a testament to our partners that they could see the future potential of this property for conservation and the Clean Ohio officials' vision that they supported this project," said Cegelka. "When constructed, the proposed trail will allow connections to be made from other trails throughout the entire region."

"The project is a critical element to a world-class trail system in the Village that will ultimately benefit the community for years to come. It has been a pleasure to help facilitate the exemplary vision of Mayor Cegelka and the Village administration," explained Joe Leslie, vice president of real estate for the Land Conservancy. Completing Tinkers Creek Preserve II required the Land Conservancy to flex its expertise in complex land acquisition and conservation funding strategies. The Land Conservancy team negotiated with several

landowners, secured critical Clean Ohio Conservation Funding on behalf of the Village of Glenwillow, coordinated all legal documents, and more to ensure the conservation of five separate parcels.

Leslie added, "No matter how complex these transactions can be, our goal is simple: conserve land for people in an effort to support healthy and thriving communities."

No Stumps – No Roots – No Foreign Matter Nothing larger than 7 inches in diameter Cut "Y" Shaped Branches in Two No Firewood – No logs less than 4 feet long Separate small from large branches Face "Cut End" of branches towards the road Free of Poison Ivy

LEASH LAW

All dogs, regardless of age, breed or size, must be on a leash when walking. Dogs are not permitted to run loose upon any public place. Owners must also keep their dogs physically confined or restrained on private property by a leash, tether, adequate fence, supervision or secure enclosure to prevent escape. The intent of this law is to protect the health and safety of the public and to protect your pet.

HELMET SMART CAMPAIGN

The Glenwillow Police Department is proud to be participating in the Helmet Smart campaign again this year. Through this campaign, we are encouraging parents to take an active role in their children's safety by encouraging them to wear bike helmets when riding.

Officers will be issuing a "Safety Citation" when they witness a child wearing a safety helmet. Present the Safety Citation, along with the coupon card at the Oakwood Village McDonald's for a *FREE ice cream cone!* The bearer of the Safety Citation is also eligible for a drawing for bicycles from AAA.

Remember, your child's bicycle is a vehicle, not a toy. Use of helmets can prevent a tragic life-long injury to your children. Only through your active involvement will your children form the helmet habit every time they ride their bicycles.

WATCH FOR MOTORCYCLES

As drivers of cars, trucks, vans, and SUV's, we have the responsibility not only to share the road, but also to take proactive measures to increase the safety of motorcycle riders who we encounter on our way.



Things Every Driver Should Know About Sharing the Road with Motorcycles

- · Always check your blind spots!
- · Be extra cautious when passing
- Use your turn signal
- Maintain an adequate distance
- Increase your following distance at night
- Be aware of weather conditions
- · Obey all posted traffic signs and signals

Remember, there is no such thing as a "fender-bender" for a motorcycle rider. They are completely exposed. Most multi-vehicle accidents involving motorcycles cause serious or fatal injuries to the riders.

PARKING REMINDER

There is **NO PARKING** on any residential street here in the Village. If you are having a party, work done on your home, special event or visitors, **please contact** the Police Department for

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parking permission. When permission is granted, be sure to park on the side of the street opposite from the fire hydrants. Parking on both sides of the street makes it difficult for emergency vehicles and school buses to get through safely.

CLICK IT OR TICKET CAMPAIGN

Seatbelts can help save lives. They are important safety features that, like air bags, help to protect a driver or passenger involved in a crash. Those who do not wear their seatbelts put



themselves at greater risk of severe injury or even death. According to NHTSA, more than 15,000 lives are saved each year in the U.S. because drivers and passengers were buckled up.

APPLIANCE TURN-IN PROGRAM

FirstEnergy's Ohio utilities will pick up and recycle your old refrigerator or freezer and you'll get \$50.

Getting rid of your old fridge or freezer couldn't be easier. We'll pick up and recycle your old fridge or freezer and you'll get \$50. Plus you can save up to \$150 a year in reduced energy costs. Recycle a working room air conditioner or dehumidifier along with a qualifying refrigerator or freezer and you'll get an additional \$25 per unit.

Program Guidelines

- Must be an electric customer of FirstEnergy's Ohio utilities
- You must own the appliance(s)
- Refrigerators and freezers must be 10-30 cu. ft., plugged in, and operating (cooling) at the time of the scheduled pickup
- Limit of two refrigerators/freezers plus up to two room air conditioners/dehumidifiers per calendar year*
- Your incentive will be mailed to you 4-6 weeks after pickup of appliance(s)
- Please note that this is NOT an appliance replacement program. Your old appliance will be removed and recycled in an environmentally friendly manner and will not be replaced with a new appliance.

PROPOSED PETTIBONE ROAD PARK



In 2016, the Village entered into an agreement with Republic Services and the Cuyahoga County Land Bank to demolish seven houses along Pettibone Road between Austin Powder Drive and Cochran Road. These seven houses owned by Republic Services were vacant and had fallen into a state of disrepair. The Village investigated the cost for renovation which would have been over \$30,000 for each home. The cost for this demolition was covered by a grant from the Land Bank.

As part of the agreement, once the houses were demolished, Republic Services was to donate 1.76 acres of land to the Village for the purpose of creating a public park. The ownership was transferred in 2018. Since the transfer, the Village has been working with our Engineer and Landscape Architect to create a Master Plan for this park, known as the Pettibone Road Park. This concept map is the latest version for the park. Planned amenities at the park include a parking lot, picnic shelter, entertainment gazebo, restrooms, and a Veterans Memorial honoring all five segments of our county's military. We recently have had conversations with the Wheeling & Lake Erie Railroad about moving the historic train depot, built circa 1893, to the park, though negotiations are ongoing. As of now, the picnic shelter and the parking lot has been built. Look for more amenities to the park next year.

DON'T FORGET TO GET YOUR DOG LICENSE ANNUALLY.

Having a license for your dog isn't only a law, but it's also a lost dog's ticket home! When your dog has its license attached to its collar, its assigned license number is all that is necessary for our Office to identify the dog's owner. If you do not buy your dog's license during this renewal period, Ohio law requires a late fee equal to the cost of the license. There are no provisions in the law to waive the fee.

The Cuyahoga County Fiscal Officer has several options for the purchase of your new or renewal dog licenses: purchase online, visit a Neighborhood Location, or download the PDF application located on the county's web page and to mail your check or money order made payable to Cuyahoga County Treasurer. Locally, you can purchase a dog license at: Pet Supplies Plus, 34370 Aurora Road, Solon, (440) 498-1250.

"Ohio law requires owners of dogs to renew their dog license each year between December 1st and January 31st."

- One Year licenses (expiring January 31, 2020) \$20.00
- Three Year licenses (expiring January 31, 2022) \$60.00
- Permanent licenses (no expiration date) \$200.00


Three Year and Permanent licenses are **NOT** available for purchase at all Neighborhood Locations, only online or at the Cuyahoga County Animal Shelter and the Cuyahoga County Administrative Headquarters You may also print out the interactive Dog License Application on the county website.

After January 31st, a penalty fee of \$20 will be assessed on the purchase of One Year, Three Year, and Permanent licenses for all dogs older than three months of age.

The penalty can be avoided if you purchase the dog license immediately upon acquiring the dog. After the renewal period of December 1st through January 31st, a penalty will be assessed for all dogs licensed that are older than three months of age and have been owned for more than 30 days. To purchase a dog license after the

open renewal period, you must do it in person at the Cuyahoga County Administrative Headquarters or at the Cuyahoga County Animal Shelter.

There are no provisions in the law to waive the fee. Dog owners with questions may contact the County Treasurer's office at 216-443-7010.
